KEY FINDINGS INCLUDE:

Weddle Was The Prosecutor Of Record In Three Charging Decisions Involving The Deaths Of Black Mississippians, And In Each One No One Was Charged. A Lee County grand jury declined to indict Tupelo Officer Tyler Cook in the June 2016 killing of Antwun "Ronnie" Shumpert, 37, unarmed and Black. A second grand jury cleared Officer Jason Whinton in the death of Lyndarious Cortez Witherspoon. And two grand juries declined to charge Karen Michelle Carpenter, a white motorist, in the October 2016 death of 9-year-old A'Miya Braxton, struck in her own driveway after Carpenter passed a stopped school bus. This is the highest-salience material in the file.

Weddle Prosecuted The First Black Woman Elected To The Tupelo City Council Over A Voter Raffle That Never Happened, And The Case Ended In A \$500 Payment After Two Years. He opened the investigation within days, announced it jointly with Secretary of State Michael Watson on the eve of the municipal election, and said "these actions will not be tolerated. I am dedicated to handling this matter aggressively." Councilwoman Nettie Davis pleaded to a misdemeanor under a non-adjudication agreement on August 14, 2023, paid \$500 with \$4,500 suspended, and kept her seat.

Weddle Donated To Donald Trump's Committee In September 2020. His \$35 WinRed contribution was earmarked for the Trump Make America Great Again Committee.

Weddle Shared Content Celebrating The Overturning Of Roe v. Wade, Praising Amy Coney Barrett, And Sharing That He Was Voting For Republican and Election Denier U.S. Rep. Trent Kelly. On his personal Facebook he highlighted the Supreme Court opinion overturning Roe, posted a photo of Justice Barrett during her confirmation hearing, and shared that he was voting for Rep. Trent Kelly.

U.S. Rep and Election Denier Trent Kelly's Campaign Committee Gave Weddle \$500 in November 2022 and His Successor As District Attorney Gave Him \$1,000 in November 2021.

Weddle Has Never Won A Judicial Election And Was Appointed To Every Judgeship He Has Held, By Two Republican Governors.

LEGAL & ETHICS

Weddle Was Named Personally As A Defendant In A Federal Civil Rights Suit While Sitting As A Judge, And The Case Was Dismissed. Bennett v. Daniels, No. 1:25-cv-00100 (N.D. Miss.), filed June 17, 2025 and terminated December 29, 2025. The docket shows summons did not issue as to Weddle until September 23, 2025; the plaintiff's counsel moved to withdraw; mail to the plaintiff was returned undeliverable; the court issued an order to show cause on December 10, 2025 with a response due December 24; and the case was then dismissed by Senior Judge Sharion Aycock. The defense motion relied on an underlying order of dismissal with prejudice [Bennett v. Daniels et al, accessed [8/26/2026](#)].

A Circuit Judge Found Weddle Had Subpoenaed A Television Station Without Court Approval, A Violation The Judge Said Could Have Supported Sanctions. In a June 26, 2023 order denying two defense motions to dismiss in the Nettie Davis case, Senior Circuit Judge Paul Funderburk found the subpoena was issued without prior court approval; Weddle admitted the error and withdrew it. The judge also corrected him on docket-setting: “Contrary to the defendant’s assertion, the District Attorney does not set the criminal docket. Rather, he submits a proposed docket, which this court is free to accept, amend, or out-right reject.”... While the violation could allow Weddle to be sanctioned, the only sanction the defense requested was dismissal of the charges” [Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal, [06/27/2023](#)].

Reeves Appointed Weddle, Of Saltillo, To Fill The Vacancy Created By The Resignation Of Judge Jim M. Greenlee. Weddle had served as District Attorney for the First Circuit Court District since 2015 and previously served as Lee County public defender, Tupelo municipal judge, and assistant district attorney. He has practiced since 1995 [Office of Governor Tate Reeves, [09/25/2024](#)].

In 2020, Mississippi Became the Center of a Scandal in Misspent Welfare Funds. The scandal involved the diversion and misuse of tens of millions of dollars in federal funds intended to help low-income families. From roughly 2016–2019, the Mississippi Department of Human Services (MDHS) routed large amounts of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funding through two nonprofits—the Mississippi Community Education Center and the Family Resource Center of North Mississippi—which then paid individuals and organizations for programs or services that were not provided, inadequately documented, or not permissible uses of welfare funds. The spending included payments to family members and associates, lobbyists, entertainers and professional wrestlers, as well as other projects with little or no demonstrated benefit to eligible families. A 2020 state audit initially questioned more than \$94 million in grant spending, and the State Auditor later sought repayment of more than \$77 million determined to have been illegally spent. Former MDHS Executive Director John Davis later pleaded guilty to federal and state charges related to directing welfare money through nonprofits and sham contracts for personal use and benefit [Mississippi State Auditor, [05/04/2025](#)] [Mississippi State Auditor, [10/12/2021](#)] [U.S. Attorneys Office, [9/22/2022](#)].

Reeves Appears to Have Helped MDHS Send \$1.4 M to a Prominent Mississippi Personal Trainer as a Part of the Scandal. “Mississippi Today reported in its 2022 “The Backchannel” investigation that [Paul] Lacoste had a 2019 meeting with Reeves, who was then the lieutenant governor, and John Davis, the former director of the

Mississippi Department of Human Services who has since pleaded guilty to federal and state charges related to the scandal. By 2019, Lacoste had already secured a \$1.4 million contract with a well connected nonprofit to receive MSDH funds for his boot camp program. Lacoste says then-Gov. Phil Bryant directed Davis to execute the agreement. But after a few months, MDHS apparently hadn't provided the nonprofit with the funds to actually pay Lacoste. That's until Davis met with Reeves. By 2019, Lacoste had already secured a \$1.4 million contract with a well connected nonprofit to receive MSDH funds for his boot camp program. Lacoste says then-Gov. Phil Bryant directed Davis to execute the agreement. But after a few months, MDHS apparently hadn't provided the nonprofit with the funds to actually pay Lacoste. That's until Davis met with Reeves [Mississippi Today, [8/21/2023](#)].

Reeves Tried to Please Brett Favre, Who Repeatedly Lobbied Reeves for Funds for a Volleyball Stadium.

One of the largest purchases at the center of the scandal is a state-of-the-art volleyball stadium at University of Southern Mississippi, a project Favre pushed welfare officials to fund. Asked about the stadium at Neshoba County Fair in the summer of 2022, Reeves suggested he didn't support the idea of using any taxpayer funds to build sports facilities. At the time, Reeves' staff had opted not to include the volleyball stadium in the MDHS civil suit to claw back misspent funds — and he had just fired Pigott. 'Look, I don't know all the details as to how that came about,' Reeves said. 'What I do know is that it doesn't seem like an expense that I would personally support for TANF dollars. I don't even like the state building stadiums with general tax dollars.' But texts that wouldn't be made public until months later revealed that Reeves did talk with Favre about finding public funding to finish construction on the stadium early in his governorship, right before the February 2020 indictments. Favre had endorsed Reeves for governor in 2019" [Mississippi Today, [8/21/2023](#)].

Gov. Tate Reeves Fired the Attorney Leading the State's Welfare Scandal Lawsuit. "In 2021, the welfare agency, which is under the statutory purview of Gov. Tate Reeves' office, hired well-known attorney Brad Pigott to lead the state's effort to claw back as many of the millions in misspent welfare funds as possible" [Mississippi Today, [8/21/2023](#)].

"One of the people being sued by the Mississippi Department of Human Services over allegations of misspending welfare money has filed a separate lawsuit against Gov. 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Opinion of the Court

reaffirm *Roe* and *Casey*, and they contend that the Mississippi law cannot stand if we do so. Allowing Mississippi to prohibit abortions after 15 weeks of pregnancy, they argue, “would be no different than overruling *Casey* and *Roe* entirely.” Brief for Respondents 43. They contend that “no half-measures” are available and that we must either reaffirm or overrule *Roe* and *Casey*. Brief for Respondents 50.

We hold that *Roe* and *Casey* must be overruled. The Constitution makes no reference to abortion, and no such right is implicitly protected by any constitutional provision, including the one on which the defenders of *Roe* and *Casey* now chiefly rely—the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment. That provision has been held to guarantee some rights that are not mentioned in the Constitution, but any such right must be “deeply rooted in this Nation’s history and tradition” and “implicit in the concept of ordered liberty.” *Washington v. Glucksberg*, 521 U. S. 702, 721 (1997) (internal quotation marks omitted).

The right to abortion does not fall within this category. Until the latter part of the 20th century, such a right was entirely unknown in American law. Indeed, when the Fourteenth Amendment was adopted, three quarters of the

The Nettie Davis Prosecution

Nettie Davis Discussed Raffle Donated Cash To Voters At A June 2021 Rally, And The Raffle Never Occurred. Davis, a 20-year council member and the first Black woman elected to the Tupelo City Council, solicited raffle donations at a June 5 rally: "We'll pull names after they have voted, and what we'll do is give this money away the day after the voting is over." She was running unopposed. Penson, chairman of the Democratic municipal executive committee, a minister and former city personnel director, had posted May 29 about churches offering "cash prizes" tied to voter participation [Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal, [10/13/2021](#)] [Clarion Ledger, [06/09/2021](#)] [Mississippi Today, [08/14/2023](#)].

Weddle Opened The Investigation Within Days And Announced It Jointly With Secretary Of State Michael Watson. On the indictments: "These actions will not be tolerated. I am dedicated to handling this matter aggressively." And: "I take election fraud seriously, and I am dedicated to handling this matter and any other violations aggressively" [Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal, [06/13/2021](#)] [Mississippi Today, [08/02/2023](#)].

Weddle Filed A Bill Of Criminal Information On July 28, 2021 That Bypassed The Grand Jury, And It Was Later Removed From Public Court Records. "District Attorney John Weddle initially tried to speed the criminal prosecution of City Councilwoman Nettie Davis by avoiding the grand jury process, according to documents obtained by the Daily Journal. On July 28, Weddle filed a bill of criminal information against Davis in Circuit Court. The document was signed by Weddle, given a cause number and stamped as filed, but has since been scrubbed from the public court record... Davis, on advice of her defense attorney, Jim Waide, did not agree to the bill of information presented by Weddle" [Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal, [10/8/2021](#)].

Local Activists Called The Use Of A Grand Jury For A Misdemeanor A "Travesty", And Democratic Leaders Rallied On September 3, 2021. "Ten people, including former Democratic U.S. Rep. Travis Childers; Jim Waide, Davis' attorney; and Jim Newman, the chairman of the Lee County Democratic Party, gathered in Fairpark Friday morning to defend Davis' character... 'I find it a travesty — and I mean that a real travesty — that someone who has devoted not only her life to teaching, but then her life to public service, should be treated so shabbily over a supposed misdemeanor,' Newman said" [Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal, [09/03/2021](#)]

Selective Prosecution Was Formally Alleged, With Davis's Attorney, Waide, Arguing A White Republican Candidate Left Uncharged On A Comparable Violation. "It's unclear why Waide is seeking Smith's appearance in court, but he could be attempting to paint a picture that state prosecutors in the area are selectively prosecuting certain cases of election law violations and ignoring others" [Mississippi Today, [08/02/2023](#)]. His motion: "The District Attorney has not announced any intent to prosecute this misdemeanor election law violation by a white Republican candidate" [The Yazoo Herald, [08/15/2023](#)].

The Case Ended August 14, 2023 In A Non-Adjudicated Misdemeanor Plea, And Weddle Did Not Respond To Press. Davis pleaded guilty, kept her seat, paid \$500 with \$4,500 suspended plus \$227.75 costs, and waived a public trial. Waide: "Once the charges were brought, we didn't have any choice but to accept an agreement where she wouldn't be removed from office." Mississippi Today reported Weddle did not respond to requests for comment and a settlement was agreed to [Mississippi Today, [08/14/2023](#)]. Davis later petitioned to expunge the charge [Mississippi Daily Journal, [09/11/2023](#)]

Weddle Stated Responding to Accusations his Prosecution was Political was “Not Worth Commenting On”. “When asked if his prosecution of two longtime leaders in the Black community and the Democratic Party is political — as some have alleged — Weddle said that accusation is not worth commenting on” [Yahoo News, [10/15/2021](#)].

Weddle Is a Republican. He was elected as a Republican District Attorney [MS SOS 2015 Election Results, accessed [8/28/2026](#)], he was appointed by Republican Governor Tate Reeves in 2024 [Office of Governor Tate Reeves, [09/25/2024](#)] and by Republican Phil Bryant in 2015 [WCBI, accessed [06/05/2015](#)]. He also documented 2026 circuit of county Republican organizations [Weddle Campaign Facebook, [06/26/2026](#), [05/26/2026](#), [05/06/2026](#)] . Mississippi Today has described him in its reporting as "a Republican" [Mississippi Today, [08/02/2023](#)].

CHARGING DECISIONS IN THE DEATHS OF BLACK MISSISSIPPIANS

Antwun "Ronnie" Shumpert, June 18, 2016. Shumpert, 37, unarmed and Black, was shot four times by Tupelo Officer Tyler Cook after a traffic stop for improper turn signal use and a missing tag light, a foot chase, and a struggle beneath a house where Cook's patrol dog located him. Cook said Shumpert punched the dog, escaped it and tackled him, that he was struck repeatedly, feared for his life and believed he would lose consciousness. Shumpert died roughly five hours later [U.S. Department of Justice, [05/16/2017](#)]. On August 2, 2016 a Lee County grand jury declined to indict, stating it "found no criminal wrongdoing on the part of Officer Tyler Cook" [Hattiesburg American, [08/01/2016](#)].

Weddle Sought A Special Grand Jury And Declined The Family's Request For An Independent Special Prosecutor. July 8, 2016: he announced he would seek a special grand jury rather than wait for

September, saying "if we can fit it in, we will" and "it's difficult to have both a regular court term and a grand jury." Asked about the family's request that an independent prosecutor handle it, he said "I feel confident we can present this case" and pointed to the Mississippi Bureau of Investigation: "we have an independent agency handling the investigation, and they will be presenting the evidence" [Fox News, [07/08/2016](#)].

Federal Authorities Later Closed Their Review Without Charges. The U.S. Attorney for the Northern District of Mississippi, the Justice Department Civil Rights Division and the FBI reviewed witness interviews, autopsy reports, crime scene documentation, surveillance video, radio traffic and incident reports, and concluded "the evidence is insufficient to prove, beyond a reasonable doubt, that Cook violated federal civil rights laws" [U.S. Department of Justice, [05/16/2017](#)].

The Shumpert Family And Their Counsel Are Documented, Motivated Critics. Attorney Carlos Moore said the family would continue to monitor the FBI and Justice Department investigations then underway. Peggy Shumpert, the widow, publicly rejected the prosecution account at the 2016 news conference: "All the evidence was right there, and you overlook it... and you call it justified!" A \$35 million federal civil rights lawsuit was filed against the City of Tupelo, not against Weddle [Mississippi Free Press, [08/02/2016](#)].

A'Miya Braxton, October 4, 2016. A'Miya Braxton, 9, was struck and killed in her driveway in North Pontotoc, Pontotoc County, by Karen Michelle Carpenter, a white motorist who passed a stopped school bus and swerved onto the sidewalk. Weddle's office presented the case to two grand juries between 2016 and 2018; neither indicted. Reported evidentiary gaps included no proof of cell phone use, no toxicology findings and an inability to determine speed at impact. Weddle: "This was a difficult case... when you start looking at the law and how it applies, it becomes a difficult issue" [New York Amsterdam News, [08/31/2020](#)].

The Family's Allegations Against Weddle Are Specific, Serious And Unproven. They alleged he improperly introduced an "intent" element absent from Nathan's Law, which requires motorists to stop ten feet from a school bus; failed to instruct clearly on the vehicular homicide statutes; and should have recused because of possible ties to Carpenter. They asked the Mississippi Attorney General to investigate potential prosecutorial misconduct. "We believe Weddle introduced this element of 'intent' and we have called on the state Attorney General to investigate," the family said in a statement" [New York Amsterdam News, [08/31/2021](#)].

A Change.org Petition Demanding A Special Prosecutor Exceeded 716,000 Signatures. Weddle is not named on the petition [Change.org, [09/15/2017](#)].

OTHER NOTABLE CASES

Weddle Was Reported In 2018 Not To Have Returned Calls About A Possible Re-Examination Of A 1959 Racial Killing. An aggregated report stated "District Attorney John Weddle did not return multiple calls" about whether his office would re-examine the 1959 killing of a Mississippi teenager [Nine, [8/21/2018](#)].
